Singleton Update from Cr. Brian Warner

Mosquitoes

Due to the large number of phone calls regarding mosquitoes the following questions and answers might be of help.

1. Does Rockingham have a mosquito monitoring program and if yes what does it monitor for and how is it carried out?

The City of Rockingham regularly undertakes mosquito monitoring throughout the mosquito season, generally from August to April. Mosquito Larval monitoring is conducted along the flood plains of the Serpentine River, this is done to identify the extent and locations of breeding sites and organise aerial larviciding treatments if required. Adult mosquito monitoring is also undertaken to collect data on the number of adult mosquitoes in particular areas.

2. Has the monitoring indicated an increased number of mosquitoes and if yes, which suburbs have been most affected?

Monitoring of the breeding sites this season has identified large areas inundated with water with extensive breeding, this is due to high storm surge tides occurring frequently. The suburbs affected are Karnup, Secret Harbour, Golden Bay and Singleton.

3. Has the council organised extra spraying this year compared with the past few years. If yes, which extra areas have been sprayed or have the same areas just been sprayed more often?

The Peel Mosquito Management Group, which the City of Rockingham is a member of, conducts regular aerial larviciding with the aim of reducing the mosquito population before they emerge as adults. This treatment phase has been occurring frequently over this summer period. The larvicide is mosquito-specific and harmless to other aquatic life present in the estuary. There have been 16 aerial larviciding treatments conducted this season in comparison to 7 aerial treatments conducted last season. Mosquito

management in the Peel region is strongly influenced by weather patterns. While weather patterns locally and across the county are clearly being impacted by one of the strongest La Nina events for some time, there may be further erratic and unfavourable environmental conditions for effective mosquito management efforts during the remainder of the 2010-11 season

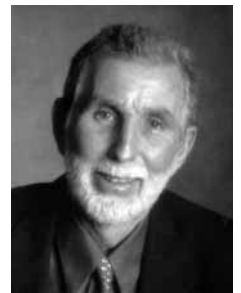

Friends of Paganoni Swamp

Members of our Friends group had another successful “weeds” day this month removing at least three Geraldton wax plants and over 15 olive trees from the reserve. It was hot and dusty work and traversing the sand tracks presented a challenge due to the lack of rain.

Trapping of brush-tailed phascogales by University of Western Australian staff and students, along with members of our Friends group, is also planned this month as part of our successful Environment Community Grant. The purpose of the project is to estimate the number of animals present in the reserve as well as available nesting tree hollows. If it is found that hollow availability is limiting the size of the population it may be desirable to install nest boxes.

Phascogales are small carnivorous, nocturnal marsupials that live predominantly in trees. Their black bushy tails which are around the same length as their head and body (average 190mm) are a distinguishing feature. These small marsupials have very strong claws which they use to tear back the bark from trees searching for prey such as insects or small vertebrates. Nectar is also part of their diet so flowering Tuarts at Paganoni Swamp Reserve are a source of food. The phascogales, in turn, assist in pollination.

Singleton residents are fortunate to have such a significant conservation reserve so close; it is vital that such a reserve is protected and conserved to ensure that it continues to provide valuable habitat for the myriad species that call it home.

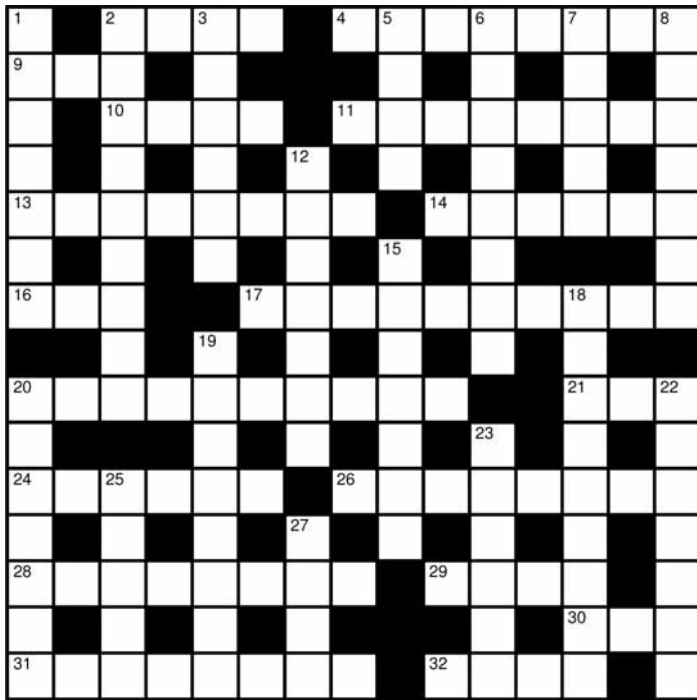
Each week there is usually a craft activity for the children as well as lots of free play with both indoor and outdoor toys. For the parents there is a coffee and morning tea provided.

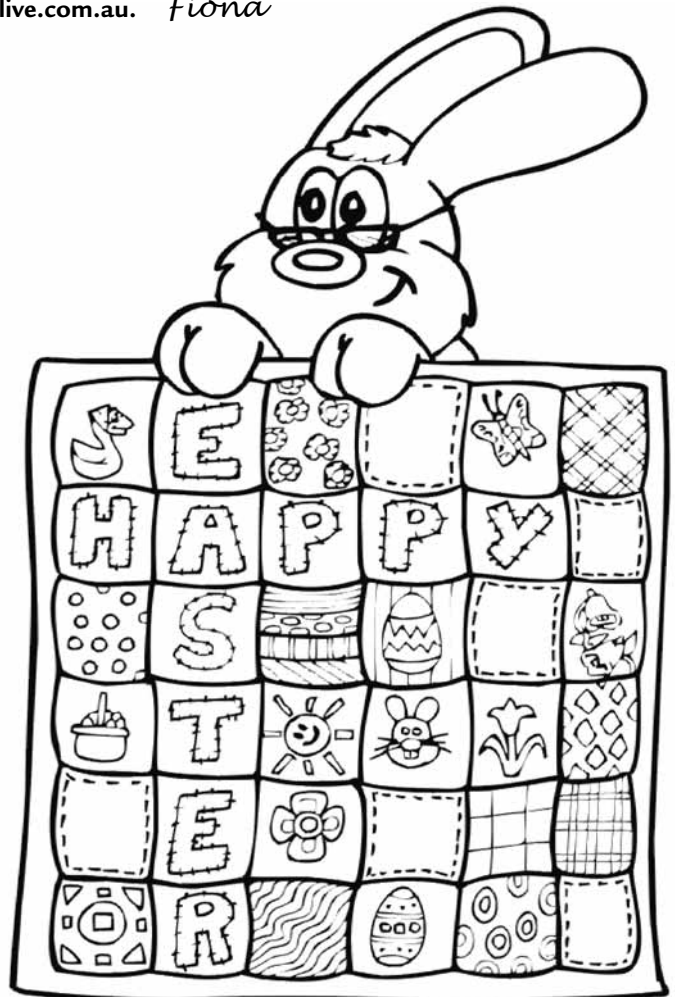

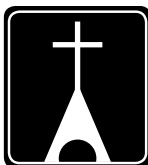
