

## Golden Bay Public Meeting

The meeting was well attended given the weather, 150 people. The developers Peet gave an opening presentation followed by Dr Chris Elliott on behalf of the Golden Bay Progress Association, Secret Harbour Residents Association and the Singleton Residents Association. He spoke to each of the motions, which are listed. These were adopted without dissent.

Chris Elliott, former mayor and councillor and longtime Singleton resident made two very salient points.

**City of Rockingham: "Do not allow yourselves to be bullied by the State government."**

**City of Rockingham: "Negotiate with the Planning Commission in arriving at an agreeable outcome to the issued raised. This has been achieved in the past."**

Debbie Alexander, the Golden Bay Progress Association President, handed a large petition and letters objecting to the nature of the development to Councillor Brian Warner, for presentation to the City of Rockingham.

Question time concluded the evening and was indicative community concern over a whole range of issues, chiefly density and the social housing ratio.

Thank you to all involved preparing for the night. This is going to be a long process - we might well have to fight on the beaches, sand dunes and wetlands. This of course does not exclude all the other matters raised. We should go with more confidence now. There was great unity at the meeting on the issues.

### Motions Passed at Community Meeting

**Request to extend the time** - That this meeting requests the City of Rockingham to extend the deadline for submissions to the Council by four weeks to enable the community to fully appraise the large and detailed submissions and then be able to

make a more informed response to the four proposals.

**Golden Bay Density** - That this meeting expresses its strong opposition to the highly dense R80, R60 and R40 proposed on this Comprehensive Development Plan. Such density is not compatible to the existing development or community and presents a risk to the amenity of the area.

### Environmental Protection Assessment

That the Rockingham City Council ensure that prior to the adoption of any new Comprehensive Development Plan a complete and thorough environment assessment of the entire area has been completed.

**Indigenous Heritage** - That the Rockingham City Council ensure that prior to the adoption of any new Comprehensive Development Plan a complete and thorough indigenous heritage assessment of the entire area has been completed.

### Infrastructure for the Socially

**Disadvantaged** - Given the population density and lack of supporting infrastructure for the socially disadvantaged in the proposed development that the Department of Housing adopt a policy of no more than 1 in 20 for social housing instead of the 1 in 9 proposed.

**Foreshore Plan** - This meeting opposes the Foreshore Management Proposal and recommends that an alternative plan be arrived at with community consultation for the entire Comet Bay foreshore integrating existing amenities.

### Proposed Amendment Scheme No 2 Amendment 106 concerning increased density

- That this meeting affirms the following statement to be communicated to the Minister of Housing and the City of Rockingham: The Golden Bay Progress Association, Secret Harbour Residents Association and Singleton Resident Association are deeply offended and disappointed at the total lack of



community consultation in regard to Stage 1 of the development in regard to increased density.

We strongly oppose being asked to give retrospective endorsement to the removal of the Residential Density Notation.

**Increasing the size of the Commercial Centre** - That this meeting states that clarification of the permitted uses of the Neighbourhood Centre must be provided prior to the updated Comprehensive Development Plan being considered by the Council.

**School and Police Station** - The meeting states that the Rockingham City Council should not agree to any increase in housing density until the State Government gives an assurance that it will construct a police station and primary school in this new development.

our local sand hills, then you should join in the protest when the next meeting is called – we will let you know the date as soon as we can. By the way the developer here is our own State Government so we need to be able to loudly say “listen to us” – to do that we need your voice.

On matters development, I found out on Friday that the land east of the oval will soon become a construction site so we will also soon see some 140 or so lots being formed. As Council had approved the development some months ago, it was to be expected that development would soon follow. The SRA, and our local Councillor Mr. Brian Warner, vainly opposed the proposed location of the road into the development, so now we will have a road coming onto Singleton Beach Road at the bottom of the hill near the oval - an accident waiting to happen and someone in “planning” will wonder why! The other aspect the SRA fought for was the retention of the trees on that side of the oval and, hopefully, they will be treated with respect and care by the developer so that they remain with us for many years to come. Of concern to some will be the height of the retaining walls that abut the oval – these range up to two metres in height. You will also be pleased to hear that the developer has sought the removal by Council of both the skate park and the cricket nets – they obviously thought these well used community amenities might affect their pricing!!

More development – at long last I am glad to say that we finally have movement on the entrance statement that the SRA has been trying to put in place for the last 3 years. Updated plans will go to Council shortly and we would hope to make a start very early in the new year.

# Singleton Update from Cr. Brian Warner



## Golden Bay Development

The public meeting held at Golden Bay on 27th July was well attended and a motion was sent to the City of Rockingham to extend the submission period beyond the advertised date of 15th August due to the public interest and the complexity of the proposed development.

The plan includes more areas of higher density housing blocks, including several possible medium "high rise" buildings (similar to that approved in Secret Harbour Boulevard). The creation of 1,700 building lots (approximately 2,200 dwellings units, with an ultimate population of 5,700 people (based on the average occupancy of 2.6 per household)

There is also included in the plan a neighbourhood centre of approximately 3,500 square metres including a supermarket of 1,800 – 2,000 m2.

## Eastern Hills

Concerns have been raised (especially in the local community newspaper) regarding the policy 3.3.17 amendment in relation to the Eastern Hills. The following is the official media release from the City of Rockingham.

### **"Does the new/replacement policy provide any protection for the view to the hills from the eastern side of Singleton and Golden Bay?"**

Yes. The newer Planning Policy 3.3.17 – Variations to Building Envelopes, does not make the same specific reference to the "townsites to the west" as was the case in superseded Planning Policy 2.8. However it does include the following more general statement.

*"Building Envelopes are positioned after considering issues associated with land degradation, the extent of any foreshore reservation, particular on-site landform and*

*vegetation characteristics, the possible form of residential development by a potential purchaser and the impact of a future development of visual amenity of the locality"*

Planning Policy 3.3.17 provides for the City to ensure that building envelopes are appropriately located to protect the visual amenity from adjacent/nearby areas (which would include views to the east from Singleton)

It is incorrect to claim the visual amenity of nearby areas would not be a consideration under Policy 3.3.17

### **"Why was the old policy replaced?"**

In light of the finalisation of Town Planning Scheme No.2 a complete review of each Statement of Planning Policy was undertaken to ensure consistency between the Planning Policies and Town Planning Scheme No. 2.

It should be noted that all the changes were advertised in the local papers and the appropriate residents associations advised. Only two submissions were received in response to the advertising – none opposing the changes.

## Karnup Train Station

Proposed Transit Oriented Development Precinct. As I have advised through this column in the past, several land owners along the Mandurah Road had approached the Council to change the zoning to allow urban development to take place. The Council have refused to entertain this proposal. In recent months a further proposal was put the WAPC for a Transit Oriented Development to take place around the future Karnup (Pagononi Road) train station.

The Council were asked to comment and a full report can be viewed on the Council website. Go to the Council Meeting Minutes of 28th June page 135 onwards.

The WA police and HIA have a Name and Shame campaign running - if you see suspicious activity on a building site call **1300 2 REWARD** or **1300 273 9273**. You could receive up to \$3000 in a reward for information leading to an arrest.

Grffiti vandalism should be reported to the City of Rockingham's community safety team on **9527 0777** and a graffiti removal kit can be provided to remove graffiti on private property. You can also contact the Community Safety team to become part of Neighbourhood Watch.

Builders sometimes leave rubbish on site that is not secured properly and subsequently blown around the suburb. This is an offence and can be reported to the City of Rockingham Building Services department. All complaints must be writing with the address details of the property in question provided. 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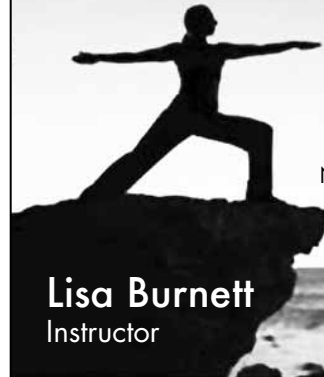
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# Research undertaken at Paganoni Swamp Reserve

**Following a prescribed burn of approximately 90 hectares at Paganoni Swamp Reserve a number of studies are being undertaken to improve our knowledge of the impacts of such burns on tuart woodland.**

Paganoni Swamp Reserve has not been burnt for over 30 years and when the Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) advised that a burn was to take place, staff from Urban Nature (a division of DEC) arranged for all those with an interest in the reserve to meet to discuss how best to obtain the greatest benefit from the burn from an adaptive management perspective.

Interests included weeds management, flora studies, tuart regeneration, the impact of burns on fauna and bird species, as well as those with an overall interest in the welfare of the reserve such as Regional Parks and our Friends group.

Our group has already assisted in the construction of ashbeds for the tuart regeneration project and fauna exclusion fences for the flora and weeds projects, and expect to be involved in the other projects as they develop. We were successful in obtaining funding from the Department of Environment and Conservation 2011 Environmental Community Grants to undertake these projects in collaboration with scientists from Murdoch University and the Department of Environment and Conservation.

Our hope is that the results from these studies will form the basis for future management decisions in relation to prescribed burns at Paganoni Swamp Reserve.

Our heroine discovers that this technology can have a bad side but it can also be used in projects that let us reconnect with family, friends and new relationships. Laurie was sensible, intelligent, quiet, easy-going until provoked. He did not suffer fools gladly. For several years, Laurie served as President of the then Singleton Progress Association.

At the time, Singleton was in the throes of achieving facilities for its fast-growing population. With a couple of tennis courts, a small Hall, and a children's swing at the Whitehead Street Park, as the only public amenities, members of the Association could see that further public facilities were imperative.

Finance was required.... and a lot of it. State and Commonwealth Grants were sought - and won. Laurie's wife, Marie, was as an equally staunch Singleton supporter, as were all members of the then Progress Association.

Society seems to advocate honouring the males of Society, but "behind every man is a good woman! This has never been so true as in the case of Laurie and Marie Stanford. They were some of the instigators to re-establish the then defunct "Singleton Progress Association". With his trusty old Holden ute, Laurie was always available to cart goods at numerous Jumble Sales, Cake Stalls, Beach Parties, or whatever fundraising function was in vogue at the time.

Marie was a fabulous cook and generous with her baking results for fundraising events. She, also, was a very sensible, practical person.

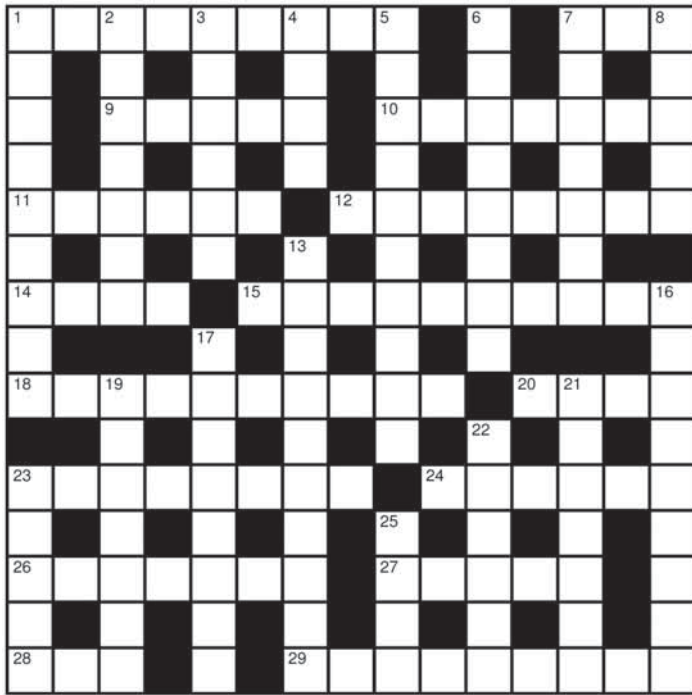


Singleton number plates are available for sale and there are only 11 sets left at a cost of \$155 per set.

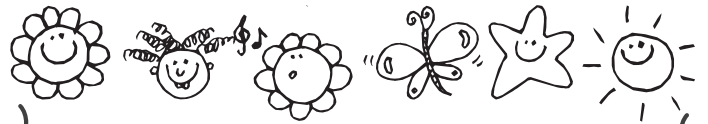

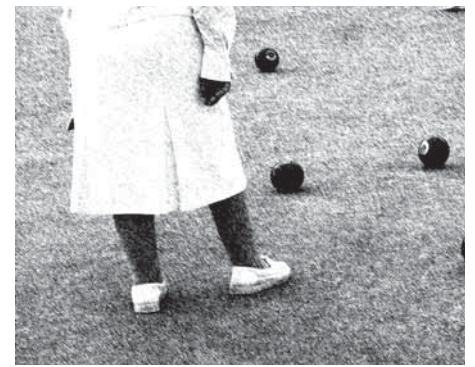
